GENERAL REGULATIONS

(EXCLUDING LIVESTOCK)

1. Exhibits to be on the ground as stated in sections.
2. **Every exhibit must be grown by or be the work of the exhibitor/organisation.** Any exhibitor may be called up to make an affidavit to that effect.
3. Exhibitors may be required to make a statutory declaration regarding the accuracy of their entry if the committee so desire.
4. If any exhibitor gives a wrong description of his or her exhibit with the intention of deceiving the Society, he or she shall be disqualified from exhibiting at any future show and shall forfeit all fees paid.
5. Exhibitors must present their exhibits to the stewards for processing. Exhibitors must not place entries in the sections until the entry has been processed or has been instructed to by the steward/s. Entries placed in sections without being processed or without instructions by steward/s will be disqualified by the Chief Hall Steward.
6. No exhibit can take more than one first prize in its or any other section.
7. The committee reserves the right of refusing or cancelling any entry without reason for doing so.
8. The decision of the committee on all points shall be final without recourse.
9. The judges may withhold prizes for such exhibits as they deem unworthy.
10. No appeal against decisions of the judges shall be entertained unless made in writing on the day of the Show and a deposit of \$4.00 made, which will be forfeited if the committee consider the same to be frivolous. Stewards to be made aware of the fact at the time. All appeals to be heard and decided on the day of the Show.
11. Vehicles are not allowed on the Show Ground on the day of the show.
(Except Disabled Passes)
12. a) All entries are received subject to Show Regulations and By-laws, under the Royal Agricultural Society Act, 1926.
b) The Society may refuse any entry without giving any reason therefore.

- c) The committee may at any time disqualify from exhibiting either indefinitely or for such a period as they think fit, any exhibitor who has, in the opinion of the committee, been guilty of any breach of these regulations, or whose conduct, whether at or during any show of the Society has in the opinion of the committee been such that he is unfit to exhibit at any show of the Society.
 - d) No person who has been disqualified from exhibiting at any show of the Royal Agricultural Society of Western Australia Incorporated, or any show of the Society affiliated therein, shall during the period of disqualification be allowed to act as agent, representative or servant of the exhibitor at any show of the Society.
 - e) During the period of disqualification, no entry will be received from any person disqualified by the Royal Agricultural Society of Western Australia, Incorporated, and should any entry be accidentally accepted, it shall be deemed to be invalid and the entry fee will be returned.
13. Any exhibit for which no class is provided, but is likely to benefit the State if entered as an extra in a competition section, may be recommended a prize or certificate if considered meritorious, but no prize can be recommended by the judges if the list contains a class in which the same can compete.
14. In the event of two exhibitors gaining an equal number of points, the one with the most first exhibits will be awarded the trophy.
15. The Society will be under no liability for any loss or damage suffered by or attributed to, the negligence of the Society, or any of its servants or otherwise howsoever.
16. All unclaimed prize money after two weeks to revert to the Society.

SOUTH WEST ZONE RULING - MEMBERS AND JUDGES ARE ADMITTED FREE. ALL OTHER ADMISSIONS TO BE CHARGED FOR ENTRY INTO SHOW GROUND.

4. The photograph must NOT be in a frame or laminated.
5. Digital manipulation must be restricted to cropping and or slight adjustment of brightness, contrast and colour saturation (except for Manipulated classes). Monochrome may be achieved by the digital removal of colour to produce a black and white or sepia toned image only.
6. Photographs can be printed by a commercial printer or home printer but the exhibit **must conform to size requirements for each class.**

FOR BEST ENLARGEMENT

Portrait

This is a photographic portrait of a person who is posing for the camera. The subject should be making eye contact with the viewer but this is not a hard and fast rule. The picture should show the subject's character and mood, happy, sad, serious etc. Lighting is very important and where ever possible natural light should be used. Flash can be used as a fill in if the subject is in shadow but try to avoid direct flash as this produces "red eye" in the subject, is very unsightly and not suitable in competition. Keep the pose simple and comfortable and avoid fussy or messy backgrounds. A background that distracts the viewer from the subject will penalise your picture. Avoid objects behind that look as if they are growing out of the subject's head. Chopping off part of a person in the photo is also undesirable unless you are using tight framing and only want the subject's head and shoulders. The photo should be printed in portrait and not landscape format.

Group Study

All of the previous comments apply. The object of this class is to produce a posed portrait of a group of people, like a family or a wedding group. Again pay attention to background and lighting, don't have your subjects squinting into bright sunlight.

Pet Portrait

All of the rules that apply to humans apply to pets. The pet should fill as much of the picture frame as possible and again check out your background for anything that will distract the viewer (and the judge) away from your subject. Try to get down to their level for best results.



Architecture

This is basically a portrait of a building designed to show the building off to its best advantage. The photo should be filled with the building and the scenery that has nothing to do with the building excluded. If there are vehicles parked in front that block your view perhaps you should wait until they are gone before taking the picture. Bright diffused sunlight is the best light, try to avoid bright midday light that throws deep shadows.

Landscape and Seascape

The object of the exercise is to try to convey to your viewers the things that interested you in the picture in order to interest others so exclude all other distractions. If you are taking a photo of the horizon in a seascape make sure it is level, many good compositions have been penalised for tilted horizons.

Sunrise and Sunsets

We have some magnificent sunsets in WA, some of the most spectacular in the world. Pointing a camera at the sky to photograph one, means that everything else on the ground will be a dark shadow. Minimise the dark area as much as possible in the picture but include interesting silhouettes that will add to the interest of the picture. Experiment is the best advice and as it is the sky that provides the interest, exclude all that intrudes except to provide a little framing or depth. The judge will be looking for impact more than anything in this class and it is keenly contested.

Open

This class is for any subject not covered by the rest of the program. All entries will be judged for impact above all else since they will have to compete against several differing subject matters. Technical correctness is a must. An entry whose subject matter is covered by another class will be shifted to that class at the discretion of the steward or the judge.

The following points will penalise your picture.

- Cluttered and messy backgrounds
- Tilted horizons
- Out of focus or blurred from a shaky camera
- Writing or labels on the front (turn off date functions for competition photos)
- Subject not filling the frame, especially portraits
- Part of the subject chopped off (feet or an arm)
- Not conforming size restrictions (too big or too small)

What the judge is looking for when judging

- Impact – does it leap out and grab you
- Technical correctness – composition, focus, redeye etc
- Presentation – Clean, no writing on the front no date
- Does it conform to size requirements – an overlarge picture will be penalised even if it is a better photo – a small photo penalises itself.

Digital Manipulation

Pictures must not be excessively manipulated by a computer program to alter their original form or to exclude or enhance parts of the original picture. The use of cropping, brightness, contrast, lightness and darkness and hue adjustments are permissible. Photos must be printed on photo quality paper by either a commercial or home printer. Pictures that have been manipulated, enhanced or even made up from several different subjects using a computer program may only be presented in the Digital Manipulation classes. Artistic creativity, imagination and impact are important for this class.

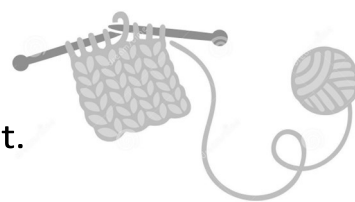

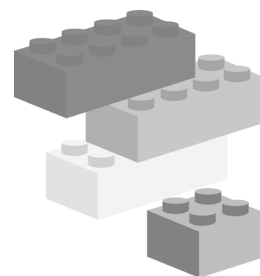

1. The following plants are NOXIOUS WEEDS in the Shire of Waroona and are not to be used in any arrangements. They are double gee, caltrop, common heliotrope, arum lily, Geraldton carnation weed, saffron thistle, variegated thistle, Patterson's curse, cape tulip, narrow leaf cotton bush, blackberry, apple of sodom, lantana.
2. **Flowers to be grown by the Exhibitor/ Organisation, with the allowable exception of the Floral Art Section.**
3. Flowers must be bright and fresh.
4. **FLORAL ART** - your plant material can be grown by the individual exhibitor, bought or borrowed.
5. If an entry states 'no restrictions', manipulation of plant material is allowed. Use of accessories, bases, drapes, decorative wiring, dried, dyed or painted materials all allowed but must not predominate.
6. Never rely on accessories alone to interpret your theme. The plant material, choice of line, colours and textures are your best tools. Nevertheless a well chosen accessory of high quality well integrated into the design could add to the beauty of the display. Flowers should always dominate.
7. Judging will be conducted under the Standards and Classifications of the W.A. Horticultural Council.
8. **NND** = Not Necessarily Distinct. (Distinct means different colours.)
9. **NES** = Not Elsewhere Specified.
10. **PANSIES** must be shown with collar. Specimen flowers to have own stem and foliage. 'Collar' means white round cardboard to support petals.
11. **ROSES** to be shown with the buds clipped off very close to the stem except floribunda. ROSES TO BE NAMED IF KNOWN.
12. **BOWL**: a container with diameter equal to, or greater than its height. Diameter of the mouth is to be no less than two thirds of the total diameter. Anything less is defined as a Vase.
13. **VASES**: Internally line clear glass vases with foil or other so stems are not visible. Height should be greater than width. Flowers are to be two times the height of the vase.
14. Oasis or Floral **Foam must be concealed.**
15. Classes **8-10** are to be displayed with flower head and one or two leaves as support.
16. **CACTUS**: a plant belonging to the Cactaceous Family.
17. **SUCCULENT**: any plant with thick fleshy leaves or stems adapted to life in arid conditions.

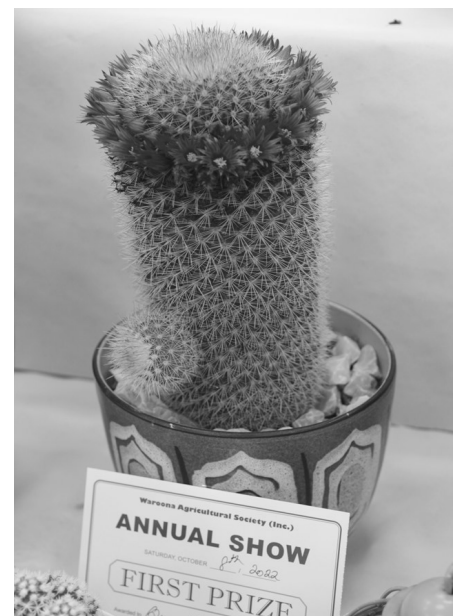

CLASS NO. 2

125g butter ** 1 cup dark brown sugar ** 500g mixed fruit **

1 level teaspoon bicarb soda ** 1 cup cold water

Place all ingredients in a saucepan and bring to the boil.

Allow to boil for one minute.

When cool add the following: 2 cups SR flour sifted ** 1 level teaspoon mixed spice alternatively with two beaten eggs.

Place in greased and base lined 20cm tin. Bake for approximately 1 to 1 1/2 hours in a moderate oven. May vary depending on your oven.

Test with skewer before removing from oven.

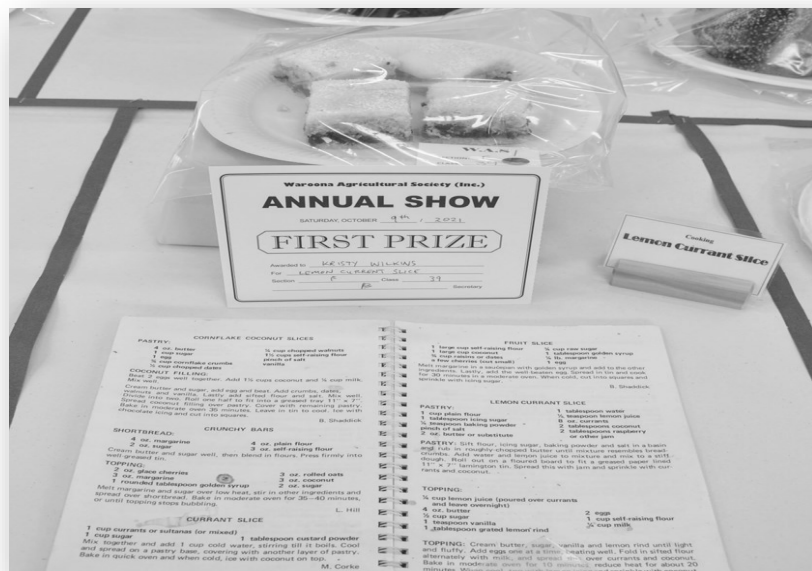
PASTRY: 1 cup plain flour 1 tablespoon icing sugar ¼ teaspoon baking powder
Pinch of salt 2 oz. butter or substitute ½ teaspoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon water 8 oz. currants 2 tablespoons coconut
2 tablespoons raspberry jam or other jam

Sift flour, icing sugar, baking powder and salt in a basin and rub in roughly chopped butter until mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Add water and lemon juice to mixture and mix to a stiff dough. Roll out on a floured board to fit a greased paper lined 11" x 7" lamington tin. Spread this with jam and sprinkle with currants and coconut.

TOPPING: ¼ cup lemon juice (poured over currants and leave overnight)
4 oz. butter 2 eggs ½ cup sugar
¼ cup milk 1 cup self raising flour 1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Cream butter, sugar, vanilla and lemon rind until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well. Fold in sifted flour alternately with milk, and spread this over currants and coconut. Bake in moderate oven for 10 minutes, reduce heat for about 20 minutes. When cool, top with lemon icing and sprinkle with coconut.

ICING: 1 cup icing sugar 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 teaspoon butter 2 tablespoons coconut
Sift icing sugar into bowl. Add lemon juice, melted butter and beat until smooth.
